Sebastian Barry was born in Dublin in 1955. Laureate for Irish Fiction 2018-2021, his novels have twice won the Costa Book of the Year award, the Independent Booksellers Award and the Walter Scott Prize. He had two consecutive novels shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize, *A Long Long Way* (2005) and the top ten bestseller *The Secret Scripture* (2008), and has also won the Kerry Group Irish Fiction Prize, the Irish Book Awards Novel of the Year, the James Tait Black Memorial Prize, and others. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, an Honorary Fellow of Trinity College, Dublin and was named a Chevalier in the French Ordre des Arts et Lettres in 2024.

In *Hidden People*, Fríða Ísberg weaves mystery, romance, and fantasy into a sharp and surprising literary tale - by turns tender, unsettling, and slyly funny - that asks what was lost, and what was gained, when Iceland stepped into modernity.

It is 1984, and the women of the Lohr family cannot fathom why Sigvaldi - 28 years old, the most handsome and eligible bachelor of the fjord - has never dated a woman. For a decade he has lived in solitude, a hermit in the old family house at Dýrleifarvík, an abandoned fishing cove beyond the mountain.

Then one day, Sigvaldi appears on his mother's doorstep with a month-old daughter in his arms - and refuses to reveal who the mother is.

The women set out to uncover the truth. As they gather clues, they unravel the family's own saga: folktales of Dýrleifarvík, the lost child of 1903, the runaway mother, strange dreams, and the eerie pull of the mountains themselves.

It doesn't hurt that the book is wonderfully well written and the style is one of its greatest strengths. The text is poetic and playful, broken up into short, separate paragraphs that the narrative bounces smoothly between. The story is also brimming with humor and infectious storytelling joy. Fríða shows once again, as she has done with her previous books, that she is not only a particularly imaginative author, but also endowed with a great gift for style, which comes across well here. When reading, the feeling is that not a single word is redundant and at the end the different threads of the story come together beautifully. *Morgunblaðið*

Fríða Ísberg is an Icelandic author based in Reykjavík. Her books include the poetry collections *Stretch Marks* and *Leather Jacket Weather*, the short story collection *Itch* and most recently, the novel *Merking* [*The Mark*], which won The Fjara Literature Prize, The Icelandic Booksellers Award, the P.O. Enquist Award, and she is the 2021 recipient for The Optimist Award, handed by the President of Iceland to one national artist. Fríða is a member of the writer's collective Svikaskáld and she occasionally writes reviews for *The Times Literary Supplement*. Her work is being translated into 17 languages.

He weaves the stories of those around him—family, friends, neighbours, fellow internal refugees—into his own narrative, and records the shockwaves of grief that strike both his own psyche and the tightly-knit extended family when loved ones are killed or homes destroyed. Amid the landscape of devastation, too, are memories of happier times; moments of unexpected joy, relief, and connection with others; and glimpses of the irrepressible strength and determination of Gazans, especially children, to continue living their lives.

Muhammad al-Zaqzouq is a writer, editor and researcher from Khan Younis, Gaza. His poetry collection *Betrayed by the Soothsayers* was awarded the 2018 Al Khalili Prize for Poetry. He has published short stories, regular book and film reviews and opinion pieces in magazines and journals. He was responsible for running an extensive network of community libraries at the Tamer Institute for Community Education, a Palestinian organization that works with children, young people, and caregivers across Palestine to promote reading, provide safe and nurturing environments for learning, and encourage self-expression through the arts. His poetry has been translated into French and his pieces have also appeared in the *New York Review of Books*, *De Standaard* in Belgium, *Il Manifesto* in Italy.







*Europe in 7½ Chapters* is a very short introduction to Europe. No such book exists. There are 100 books of 1000 pages about Europe, but none of 100 pages – and there's a reason for that. To introduce a continent with such a long history and boundless contemporary complexity in a few plain words is much more difficult than to cover it at encyclopedic length.

Timothy has spent a lifetime studying Europe and so feels just about ready to do this. Rather than a conventional Eurocentric narrative ('From Caesar to the Euro'), this book takes a series of thematic slices, like a CT scan. Each scan illuminates a different aspect of this unique continent, illustrated with vivid detail and individual stories. As we proceed, there's a broad forward movement from past to present to future.

Timothy starts with the view from outside and throughout he looks at Europe in the perspective of today's increasingly post-Western world.
